


THE CAUCASUS AZERBAIJAN, GEORGIA AND ARMENIA

At the crossroads of Asia and Eastern Europe, between the Black Sea and the Caspian Sea, the Caucasus is a unique travel destination. Few tourists visit this fascinating region but those who do are struck by its beauty, culture and history. On this trip, you'll pass snow-capped mountains, glaciers and gorges; dine with local families; and explore rock-hewn villages, mosques and UNESCO World Heritage-listed monasteries and churches.

Azerbaijan is a country boasting a history that dates back to prehistoric times and evidence of stone-age settlements. From the dynamic capital city of Baku to charming villages filled with stone buildings and cobblestone streets, to the ancient city Sheki, it is a country of contrasts. Azerbaijan was an important part of the Great Silk Route, and nowadays its economy is based on the abundance of oil and gas reserves. It is home to the UNESCO World Heritage-listed rock art site Gobustan and is the birthplace of the ancient Zoroastrian religion.

Georgia has an ancient culture and a unique alphabet found nowhere else in the world. Over the centuries all her neighbours have coveted over her land. Turks, Persians, Mongols, Arabia and the Russians have invaded and periodical civil war has also left its mark. But nowadays, it is a peaceful country becoming known for its quality wines and spectacular scenery. The capital, Tbilisi, has a modern European vibe, with cosy cafes, art galleries and theatres. Yet, leave the city and it may feel like travelling in medieval times, amongst palaces, castles, fortresses and rock-hewn villages. The UNESCO World Heritage-listed ancient capital Mtskheta sits at the confluence of the Aragvi River, and its 11th-century Svetitskhoveli Cathedral is where Christ's robe was buried. Admire the views of snow-capped mountains, gorges and glaciers as we travel through the country and the higher Caucasus Mountain range, reaching heights of over 5,000 metres.

This fascinating region has been overlooked by travellers for too long. Now is the time to visit, as it emerges as a destination for adventurous travellers.



Day 1, Thursday 18th May IN TRANSIT

Depart Australia for Baku, the capital city of Azerbaijan. Flights (not included in your tour cost), are to be confirmed but likely to be through Doha with Qatar.



Day 2, Friday 19th May BAKU WALKING TOUR

On arrival you will be met by the local guide at the airport and transferred to your hotel for check-in.



Today the group will visit Baku's core sights including Nizami Street area and Fountain square. For many years this area has been a favourite location for the locals with its abundance of shops and places to eat and

share stories. We'll then head to the waterfront promenade for a visit to the Old City and fortress. You'll see the historically significant buildings including the Palace of the Shirvan Shahs, the symbol of the city - Maiden Tower, Karvansarays and the most important mosques. The Old Town walls which

have been well preserved, along with the narrow, cobbled-stoned streets and numerous labyrinths show how Baku would have looked hundreds of years ago. We'll head back to the hotel late in the afternoon to freshen up before our official welcome dinner. **D**

Day 3, Saturday 20th May BAKU – GUBA – KHYNALIQ – KRASNAYA SLOBODA

After breakfast, we'll depart for Guba. Guba is located in the North-Eastern slopes of Mount Shahdag in Greater Caucasus, at an altitude of 600 metres above sea level, on the banks of the Kudyal river. Despite the fact that Guba is now a small town, in the Middle Ages it was the capital of Guba Khanate. We'll visit the core sights including the Juma Mosque and local carpet factory where locals weave carpets with characteristic patterns that are common in this region. Then we'll travel to the small, ancient Caucasus village of Khinalig, located high in the Caucasus mountains, at an altitude of 2,350 metres above sea level in the Guba region. Khynalygs have been living in the Caucasus for thousands of years. The village is inhabited by 2,000 light-skinned, blue-eyed people who consider themselves to be descendants of the Prophet Noah. Guests can take a short walk around the village. In good weather, the slopes offer a view of



the snow-capped peaks of the Caucasus. Later, we'll drive to Baku, dinner. *B/D*



This morning we'll drive to Gobustan to see the perfectly-preserved rock paintings or petroglyphs as they are known. Gobustan Rocks reflect the prehistoric period of human existence of this region for nearly 15,000 years from the end of the era of the Upper Paleolithic until the Middle Ages. Azerbaijani scientists have found, described and studied more than 4,000 petroglyphs and this important work continues. You'll visit the interactive museum to learn more about this site before heading to the fascinating mini mud volcanos just north of the city. The last destination today involves a tour to "Ateshgah" - the Fire Worshippers Temple which is located not far from Baku. "Ateshgah" means the Place of Fire. It was built on the land where natural gas burned eternally and worshipped by Zoroastrian believers. Zoroastrianism (sometimes called less correctly 'fire worshipping'), one of the world's oldest religions, first began in Azerbaijan. Freshen up at the hotel prior to dinner. B/D



Day 5, Monday 22nd May BAKU – LAHIJ – SHEKI

Today we say goodbye to Baku and surrounds, check out of our hotel and head

north-west towards the Georgian border. The first thing you'll notice is that after you've left the great city region, you'll reach a desert-like environment. Along the way we will visit the famous Lahij village in the Ismayilly district. Most part of 2,000 people living in Lahij are involved in ancient crafts such as engraved copper work and carpet weaving. In the mid-19th century, there were more than 200 workshops in Lahij. Traders discovered Lahij crafts many centuries ago, and sold them for high prices at bazaars in Baghdad [now Iraq], Shiraz [now Iran] and other Middle Eastern cities. Stop by a copper workshop for an impromptu lesson in ancient craftsmanship you'll get to see coppersmiths use small mallets to decorate plates, trays, jugs, goblets and pitchers, just as their ancestors have done for centuries. Lunch is included today in a guest house. Then the group will drive on to Sheki where we'll stay for the one night. After hotel check-in we'll take a city tour (either in the afternoon or in the following morning). Sheki is one of the most famous and ancient places in Azerbaijan. Situated at over 2,000 feet above sea level, the city is surrounded by the mountains and forests of oak trees. Sheki was once an important stop on the Great Silk Route. We'll start our Sheki tour from visiting the 18th century

Khan's summer palace with magnificent frescos and exquisite stained glass work. Then we will visit a "Shebeke" workshop where you'll meet local craftsman who will tell about their process. After we will also visit workshop of Sheki baklava that is popular all over Azerbaijan before visiting the Albanian church which is located in Kish village. As the legend says, this church is the first Christian church built not only on the territory of the Caucasian Albania, and in general - in whole Transcaucasia. This place is also remarkable because the burials of people whose constitution is different from the present inhabitants of the region were found at the temple. Scientists and researchers who have studied the found skeletons have come to the conclusion that they belong to tall people, with blond hair and blue eyes. Dinner is at a local restaurant. B/L/D

Day 6, Tuesday 23rd May SHEKI – SIGHNAGHI – TBILISI

Today after breakfast we continue north-west towards the Georgian Lagodekhi border to meet our new guide. The drive will be about 2 hours. Like all border crossings in this region, expect some bureaucracy and some walking with your bags through a no-mans-land area. Once we have finalised border formalities we will meet our Georgian guide who will be with us for the remainder of the tour. Get ready to see what many people say, is one of the most scenic countries on the planet.

Next, we drive to Sighnaghi. The city was established in the XVIII century and was fortified with 5 km long wall still evident today. Modern Sighnaghi is the beautiful architectural site of combined Georgian and Italian design. Here you can walk in the parks and cobbled streets, aligned with the local handicraft studios and markets. Visit a local wine cellar, where we'll be able to taste different varieties of Georgian wines. Then on to Tbilisi. Dinner at a local restaurant. B/D



Day 7, Wednesday 24th May TBILISI

This morning brings a tour of Tbilisi, including the National Museum and the Sameba Cathedral, the largest in the Caucasus. Discover the fashionably cozy cafes and art galleries of Shardeni Street before we visit the cosmopolitan and arty scene of Rustaveli Avenue. In the afternoon, a visit to Old Tbilisi. (Note, you will have the opportunity to explore Tbilisi at leisure when returning. Dinner is at a local restaurant then we'll take a short walking tour across the Freedom Bridge to see the lights at night. *B/D*

Day 8, Thursday 25th May KAZBEGI VIA MTSKHETA AND ANANURI

After breakfast, take a short drive to Mtskheta, a UNESCO- listed site and an ancient capital of the



Georgian Kingdom from the 3rd Century BC. Among other things, we will visit the magnificent C11th Svetitskhoveli Cathedral where Christ's robe was buried and the C6th Jvari monastery sitting high on a rocky mountaintop. The stunning drive along the Tergi River leads to Kazbegi, along the way passing Ananuri Castle and Jinvali water reservoir. Dinner is planned back at the hotel in Kazbegi. *B/D*





After breakfast we'll transfer to 4WD vehicles for the drive to Gergeti Trinity

Church located at an altitude of 2170m. This is one of the great sights of Georgia. Weather permitting, catch a glimpse of Mt Kazbegi, one of the highest mountains of Eurasia at 5047m. Afterwards drive to the Dariali Gorge and have a short trekking tour to the Gveleti water fall. Return to the hotel for a free afternoon to hit the bar or just relax. Dinner is at the hotel. *B/D*

Day 10, Saturday 27th May KAZBEGI – KUTAISI VIA GORI AND UPLISTSIKHE

If you don't mind rising early, grab your camera and, weather permitting, take a photo of the sun rising on Mt Kazbegi. After breakfast, we'll drive to the 11thcentury city of Gori and visit the Joseph Stalin Museum plus his personal train. We'll also see the home where he was raised. Then a drive to nearby Uplistsikhe, an ancient rock-hewn town known as "The Lord's Fortress". Built high on the rocky left bank of Mtkvari River, some structures date from 2000BC through to the late middle ages and it is also notable for its unique combination of different styles of rockcut cultures. (Some of the walking here is a little steep and there is also a tunnel to walk through (if opened) so for those who don't like enclosed spaces, you may want to wait at the café below. Later we arrive in Kutaisi – the country's second largest city and former capital. Check in to the hotel for a two-night stay and dinner. B/D



Day 11, Sunday 28th May KUTAISI

We'll tour Kutaisi this morning, visiting the Bagrati Cathedral and impressive Byzantine Gelati Monastery, a 12th-century masterpiece of the Georgian Golden Age that is now a UNESCO world heritage site. Archaeological evidence indicates Kutaisi functioned as the capital of the ancient Colchis kingdom and at the end of 2012, it resumed its role when re-established as Georgia's governing city with the new parliament building designed by Spanish architect, Alberto Domingo Kabo. *B/D*



After breakfast we will drive to the Samegrelo Region and visit the Martvili Canvon, which is one of the best nature sites of Georgia. 700 m long stone paved circular route starts from Martvili Canyon visitor centre and crosses the Dadiani historical trail. There are 2 bridges, 3 platform views and historical 30 steps stair constructed by large limestone boulders. Next, we take a boat tour in Martvili Canyon before heading to Svaneti region, one of the highlights of the tour. The scenic drive to Mestia in the Svaneti region of high mountains and glaciers is simply stunning. (Consider some snacks for the road trip as there aren't many places to stop for lunch). Before arriving in to Mestia we'll visit the Enguri Dam which at 271 metres, is the second highest concrete arch dam in the world and creates a reservoir in the picturesque gorges of Samegrelo and Svaneti mountains. Check in to the hotel for dinner and a four-night stay. B/D

Day 13, Tuesday 30th May MESTIA

After breakfast the group will drive to the Chalaadi glacier (20 minutes from the hotel) for a challenging walk to



see nature at her best (about 3.5 hours return, with some sections rated hard). This walk is only for the active travellers. Then, lunch is arranged at a local restaurant in Mestia with the afternoon free before dinner. For those not up to the walk, you can stay at the lodge and meet the group for lunch or go into visit the small township. *B/L/D*

Day 14, Wednesday 31st May DAY TRIP TO USHGULI

Camera's ready! Today is another major highlight of the trip. The group will take the most scenic drive by 4WD Jeeps to UNESCO-listed Ushguli, a community of four villages which, at 2200m, is considered to be the highest populated place in Europe. We'll have lunch at a local guesthouse and learn how to make the local specialty of cheese and kubdari. Visit the local ethnographic museum before driving to Nakipari to visit the 12th-century St George's church. If you have the chance, take a walk through a few of the villages and meet some of the locals. On the way back to Mestia drive to Tetnuldi ski resort which offers wonderful views all-around. Return to Mestia for dinner. B/L/D



Day 15, Thursday 1st Jun MESTIA

This morning we'll visit Mestia's Ethnographic and Machubi Museums. In the afternoon, take the cable



car (weather permitting) to the top of Hatsvali Mountain ski resort and enjoy the panoramic mountain views – this is a great option for lunch (at own expense). There may be an hour or two free time in Mestia and a great tip is to watch a local Georgian movie in the small café/cinema just 5 minutes from the centre of town, overlooking the river. Your guide will provide details. *B/D*



Day 16, Friday 2nd Jun MESTIA – BATUMI

Today we'll make the drive to Batumi, located on the Black Sea and arguably Georgia's most beautiful city.

(It's almost opposite Istanbul if you look due west). We'll stop for a pick-up lunch on the way at Zugdidi (or nearby). Of the several sculptural artworks on display of particular interest is the "Ali and Nino" statue by Georgian sculptor Tamara Kvesitadze – two towering human forms made out of metallic discs and constantly on the move. The figures draw closer and kiss, before continuing their path and passing through one another, eventually parting and facing in opposite directions, tragically representing a Muslim boy and Christian girl separated by the invasion of Russia. Check in to the hotel for a two-night stay with dinner at a local restaurant. If you're up for it, go for a stroll around the hotel to get a feel for the city at night. B/D





This morning we'll stroll Batumi's busy boulevard, a park strip fronting the main beach —

with its trees, paths, fountains, cafes and beach bars, it's the life and soul of Batumi. We'll also walk through the lovely botanical gardens which will take about 2 hours (up and down hills) and take in some lovely views over the Black Sea. Later, enjoy a short boat trip on the Black Sea to view the city from the water. B/D



Day 18, Sunday 4th Jun BORJOMI

Today is mainly a day of transfers. After breakfast, we'll drive to Borjomi. On arrival to our hotel, check-in and stroll around the small township including the gardens and waterfall. Make sure you try the "unusual" warm spring water. About 3.5kms from the entrance of the Borjomi Central Park, you will discover a treasure of nature - Hot Sulfur Pools placed between the forest and the rocky river. Sulfur

Pools - the average temperature of which is 32-38 C° - are very beneficial for health. The territory is equipped with free Wi-Fi, café-bar, changing rooms and showers. *B/D*

Day 19, Monday 5th Jun BORJOMI TO AKHALTSIKHE AND VARDZIA CAVE

After breakfast we'll travel to Vardzia, a rock-hewn complex on the bank of the river Mtkvari, founded in the 12-13th centuries. Initially planned as a townfortress, the complex became a well-fortified monastery which played a significant role in political,

cultural, educational and spiritual life of the country. In the middle of the complex is a Church of Assumption, richly decorated with mural painting. Note that there is some



uphill walking and some cave walking, both of which could be considered hard and not for everyone. (Even if the local mini bus takes you up the hill, there is still about 500 metres to walk, most of which is uphill). After excursion have a lunch at a local restaurant in Vardzia. Then drive to Akhaltsikhe and visit the Rabati fortress, the main sight of the town. Return back to Boriomi. *B/L/D*

Day 20, Tuesday 6th Jun BORJOMI TO TBILISI

After breakfast transfer from Borjomi back to Tbilisi, which takes about 2 hours. Today is a free day to enjoy the sights of Tbilisi or to shop and mix it with the locals in the area right near the hotel. There are many things to see and do and your tour leader will provide options for you. Note, today is at your own leisure and not guided or hosted. Dinner at a local restaurant. B/D

Day 21, Wednesday 7th Jun TBILISI TO BAVRA BORDER

After breakfast, we'll transfer to the Armenia border. Today is mainly a day of driving. After border formalities, there will be a change of transport and guide. Arrive at Bavra late in the afternoon. (Note, there is a 500 metre walk into "no-man's" land between borders and you will need to carry your own luggage along a bumpy road as there is no transport option)

WELCOME TO ARMENIA

In the afternoon we'll arrive into Gyumri - the second largest city in Armenia and an important cultural centre in the late 19th and early 20th century. You'll see its historical centre of Alexandropol with its many traditional 19th century houses and visit a museum located in one of them. Check into the hotel (which is ultra-kitsch) for a lovely dinner and an overnight stay. B/D





Day 22, Thursday 8th Jun TO YEREVAN VIA EJMIATSIN

Breakfast starts around 8.30 am at this particular hotel so we suggest you take a walk

through the local markets near the hotel if you are an early riser. Chat to the friendly local's (with handsignals) and a smile. If you need currency, ask the hotel manager for the local bank manager to come to the hotel — a great service offered by them. After breakfast we'll drive to Ejmiatsin and visit the main cathedral and Hripsime church. Ejmiatzin means "the coming of the only begotten" because it is said Jesus descended here from heaven to show where he wanted a church to be built. Continue to beautiful Yerevan and check into the hotel for a three-night stay. Time permitting, take a stroll around the hotel as its very safe and there are many shops, café's and parks. Dinner is at a traditional restaurant where you can taste national Armenian cuisine. *B/D*

Day 23, Friday 9th Jun YEREVAN AND EXCURSION TO GEGHARD AND GARNI TEMPLE

Today take an orientation drive around Yerevan city and visit the manuscript museum, home to one of the world's richest depositories of medieval documents and books spanning many subjects and in many languages. Make the short drive to the Geghard Monastery whose name derives from the legendary



lance that was used to pierce the body of Christ, and which was housed here for centuries. Though the exact foundation of the monastery is unknown, the present complex

was built in the mid-13th century. Enjoy a choir performance before walking along the canyon, past the beautiful 9th-century basalt bridge over the Azat River. Visit Garni, a pagan Temple built in the 1st century. Then we'll stop for a late lunch at a local family's home (Abelyan's House) where they will show you how they make their delicious bread! Return to Yerevan for dinner at a local restaurant. *B/L/D*

Day 24, Saturday 10th Jun YEREVAN AND SURROUNDS

Start today's tour of Yerevan city with a short drive to Khor Vira Monastery where Gregory the Illuminator, who introduced Christianity to Armenia, was imprisoned for about 13 years. Enjoy the spectacular

view of the sacred Ararat Mountain, an immortal symbol of Armenia (which now sits on Turkish soil). Back in town, visit the history museum in Republic Square to gain a good general understanding of the history and culture of Armenia and its people. Then we'll drive to the Genocide museum which can be very emotional but a must-see as it's a very important part of the country's recent history. Back midafternoon to the hotel. Dinner is at leisure tonight with many great local options. A good tip would be to walk down to the square past the opera house where you have many choices! **B**



Day 25, Sunday 11th Jun TO DILIJAN VIA SEVAN AND GOSHAVANK

Depart Yerevan for Lake Sevan, one of the world's largest high-altitude lakes at 2000 metres above sea level and a popular vacation spot. Discover the beautiful church on the hilltop (about



250 steps up). Then stop at a local bakery to buy lunch. Visit the local museum in Dilijan to learn about the history of the region before departing for the impressive 12th-13th century Goshavank monastery. Dinner tonight is at the hotel. *B/D*



First stop today is at the UNESCO-listed medieval Haghpat Monastery, built halfway up a hillside on a mountain cirque – when not wreathed in cloud, the views are lovely. The monastery's oldest structure, the Holy Cross Church, was built before 1000AD. Then drive back to Yerevan.

Day 27, Tuesday 13th Jun Departure

After breakfast, we'll transfer to the airport for the flight home to Australia, arriving home the following day.
