



The Desert Trails of RAJASTIAN

NEW TOUR DEPARTS FEB 2025

22 DAYS India is a study in contrasts: a historical backdrop for a modern-day industrial narrative, a traditional outlook co-existing with fresh, global lifestyles, and an ensemble of ethnic disparities creating a cohesive cultural identity.

On the western part of the country, the desert state of Rajasthan brims with heritage – beautiful palaces, historic forts, regal havelis, mansions, and a resplendent route to journey on.

The desert folk with lineages of royalty intermingled with rustic communities have long endured the adversities of the land. Their way of

life evolved in the arid environment – from the cuisine using the desert plant life to clothing helping them stand against dunes, from the folk music that sings of water and wells to the dance forms that mimic the desert wildlife, and from the masonry skills that carved intricate designs into local stones to yielding threads from animal hair.

Follow our Desert Trails of Rajasthan for an insight into what made ancient fiefdoms flourish and learn of their lost and lingering legacies! You'll meet wonderfully warm locals, visit villages, towns, cities with their bustling markets, forts and museums, plus you'll see a plethora of wildlife and go tiger spotting in national parks. This is India at her very best.







CRETE, CYPRUS & RHODES

22 DAYS The story of Cyprus' tumultuous past is told through its historic sites, Roman ruins, multifaceted museums, and dusty urban streets. This ease of accessibility is highlighted in Paphos, where one of the most important archaeological sites sprawls like an ancient theme park.

Experience modern Cyprus's intrinsically different Greek and Turkish societies with its fractured identity, passionate people and culture, and beautiful landscape and lifestyle. Crete's natural beauty is equalled only by the richness of its

history. The island is the birthplace of the first advanced society on European soil, the Minoans, who ruled over much of the Aegean some 4,000 years ago.

You'll find vestiges of this mysterious civilisation all over Crete, including the famous "Palace of Knossos", the legend of the labyrinth of King Minos and the slaying of the Minotaur by Theseus to save the king's daughter, Ariadne.

At the crossroads of three continents, consecutive invaders have coveted and occupied Crete.



Rhodes is rightly celebrated for the splendour of its medieval architecture and evocative old town, and it is generally considered one of the most beautiful in the Greek Islands. The crusader Knights of St John (1309-1522) called Rhodes home after their expulsion from the Holy Land, and it is their legacy of massive castles and the old town that we enjoy today. Standing astride the harbour entrance is the Colossos of Rhodes, a bronze statue of Helios, the Sun-God, erected in 290 BC and one of the Seven Wonders of the Ancient World.



URUGUAY, PARAGUAY & BOLIVIA PEPARTS APR 2025



20 DAYS Wedged between Argentina and Brazil, the small nation of Uruguay is often overlooked by travellers on their tours of South America. This makes it the ideal place to experience everyday 'not made for tourists' moments. Whether strolling the cobbled streets

of UNESCO-listed Colonia or sipping maté in the cosmopolitan capital Montevideo, the laid-back culture welcomes travellers. Uruguay's boutique-style wine country is making its mark on the global map and must be enjoyed alongside delicious picada, a traditional snack.

Even further off the "gringo trail", at the heart of the continent, is the landlocked country of Paraguay. The capital, Asuncion, is the ideal place to learn about the history and culture of the region, and it has many museums and galleries. Yet, just beyond the city, you may feel like you have stepped back in time, visiting artisans' workshops set against a rural backdrop. It is a country of contrasts, and one that your circle

of contacts are unlikely to have visited, given it is well and truly off the tourist trail.

Celebrated for its colourful history, fascinating customs, and jaw-dropping landscapes, it's easy to see why Bolivia and travel are a match made in heaven. Over 60 per cent of Bolivia's population is of indigenous descent, with a further 30 per cent from mixed indigenous and European origins, making it the most indigenous country on the continent. There are wonderful Incan ruins to be explored, yet the Spanish colonisation can still be strongly felt: the "white city" of

Sucre is a UNESCOlisted site. The phenomenal Salt Flats are a photographer's dream and a mustdo experience in Bolivia. So, too, is the monumental Lake Titicaca, the world's highest navigable body of water at 3,800 metres above sea level, reflecting the Andes ranges.

If you're looking for the things South America is known for — ancient lncan ruins, colonial architecture, UNESCO-listed sites, and epic landscapes — in the places lesser travelled, this is the trip for you.

Still, its brilliance and unique place in human history resulted from the interchange of ideas, innovations and philosophies amongst the very different peoples that used it. Uzbekistan has three standout historical places of interest – Samarkand, Bukhara and Khiva. All three are very special in their own way, and no trip to Uzbekistan is

complete without seeing their mosques, colourful markets and city squares.

Turkmenistan is a wonderful mix of old and new. The ancient ruins of Merv & Nisa contrast the glistening streets of the ultra-modern capital Ashgabat.

The countryside of Kyrgyzstan is like a postcard at every turn. Snowcapped mountains with bright green fields in the foreground, yurts dotting the countryside, lakes, rivers and picturesque townships.

Kazakhstan is the world's ninth-biggest country and the most developed in the region. The capital, Almaty, retains a distinctly Russian feel and is a wonderful city to stroll and explore.

Tajikistan sits at the "roof of the world", high in the Pamir Mountain range. Its fascinating historical landscape is shaped by various civilisations that have left their mark, including Greek, Buddhist, Hindu, Zoroastrian and Islamic.

With pockets of our itinerary rarely visited by tourists, you'll find warm and interested local people all along the way. Prepare your camera and your curiosity for this fascinating journey through history.





Azerbaijan is a country boasting a history that dates to prehistoric times and evidence of stone-age

settlements. From the dynamic capital city of Baku to charming villages filled with stone buildings and cobblestone streets to the ancient city of Sheki, it is a country of contrasts. Azerbaijan was an important part of the Great Silk Route, and nowadays, its economy is based on the abundance of oil and gas reserves. It is home to the UNESCO World Heritage-listed rock art site Gobustan and is the birthplace of the ancient Zoroastrian religion.

else. Over the centuries, all her neighbours have coveted her land. Turks, Persians, Mongols, Arabia and the Russians have invaded, and periodical civil war has also left its mark. But nowadays, it is a peaceful

Georgia has an ancient culture and a unique alphabet found nowhere

country that is becoming known for its quality wines and spectacular scenery. The capital, Tbilisi, has a modern European vibe, with cosy cafes, art galleries and theatres. Yet, leaving the city may feel like travelling in medieval times, amongst palaces, castles, fortresses, and rock-hewn villages. The **UNESCO World Heritage-listed**

ancient capital Mtskheta sits at the confluence of the Aragvi River, and its 11th-century Svetitskhoveli Cathedral is where Christ's robe was buried.

Admire the views of snow-capped mountains, gorges and glaciers as we



travel through the country and the higher Caucasus Mountain range, reaching heights of over 5,000 metres. Travellers have overlooked this fascinating region for too long. Now is the time to visit, as it emerges as a destination for adventurous travellers.





14 DAYS This wonderful tour offers medieval history, fabulous food and wine, picturesque countryside, and Dracula! Bulgaria is a great mix of cultural influences and traditions. Greek, Roman and Turkish existence is clearly evident. It is a relatively small country with a population of just 7 million. For a small country, however,

Bulgaria packs a lot of interest for travellers. It boasts 9 UNESCO-listed World Heritage sites. Caught up in both WWI and WWII and formerly part of the Eastern Block States, Bulgaria is relatively fast-growing compared to some of its neighbours and joined the European Union in 2007. You'll love the capital, Sofia, a mix of old and cool.

Romania has a large population for a small country – around the same as our own at 23 million. It is surrounded by Bulgaria, Serbia, Hungary, Ukraine, and Moldova, and a

small stretch of the Black Sea prevents it from being landlocked. Much of its landscape is picturesque, with the Carpathian Mountains occupying the centre of the country.

There is much to see and do in this mainly Christian Orthodox country. The region of Transylvania is well known for its castles, churches and beautiful forested mountains. Around 30% of the country's workers are employed in agriculture. The quality of their wines has increased dramatically over the years, so much so they are selling it all over Europe! The cities in the Transylvania region will surprise you with their cosmopolitan feel and beauty.







The Best of ALASKA DIN 201

DAYS Alaska is a nature lover's utopia – ice-capped mountains, ancient forests, pristine lakes and rivers full of fish. Separated from the US mainland by Canada's British Columbia – Alaska also happens to be the most sparsely populated state of the US...which makes it even more desirable for those who love the great outdoors. The modern history of the region is fascinating. Various indigenous tribes roamed the region for thousands of years before the Russians established a settlement. The US government purchased Alaska from the Russian government in 1867 for 2¢ an acre – about \$7 million! It became an official US territory in 1912 and an official state – the US's 49th State – in 1959. In the late 1960s, oil was discovered, and an oil boom soon followed. Pipelines, refineries, roads, townships, and other infrastructure soon followed. Today, agriculture, fishing, and tourism make up the primary industries.

Alaska's capital city, Anchorage, has a population of around 300,000, 10 times that of the nearest cities, Fairbanks and Juneau. The region is incredibly sparse, with vast wilderness and some small towns dotting the state. There's an abundance of wildlife to be spotted in Alaska. It's most famous for the brown and black bears found in healthy numbers. You are almost guaranteed to see the bears depending on the regions you visit. Caribou, moose and bison are also commonly spotted. The rivers are filled with trout and salmon. Watching bears feed during the spawning period is the classic Alaskan postcard. There are hundreds of bird species to be found – including the iconic national emblem – the American Bald Eagle, which is no longer on the endangered species list. Orca and various species

of whales can also be spotted off the Alaskan Coast and Bering Sea.

This moderately active tour takes in national parks, wildlife, history, trekking, local culture, and much more. Alaska is generally regarded as one of the most scenic places on the planet. Come see it for yourself.









CENTRAL AMERICA

Nicaragua, El Salvador, Honduras & Guatemala

EPARTS AY 2025

24 DAYS Four countries...similar but different. Nicaragua is the largest of the Central American countries in terms of land size. It was colonised on the Pacific coast by the Spanish and on the Atlantic coast by the British. Add an African-Caribbean influence with indigenous peoples and you have a fabulous melting pot of cultures. The Contra War of the 1980s caused widespread poverty and casualties; however, more recently, there has been modest economic growth. Now is a good time to visit, given tourism is in its infancy, and you can experience the genuine culture.


By contrast, El Salvador is Central America's smallest country by land size and the only country in the region without a coastline on the Atlantic/Caribbean side. It has a high population density, with around 7 million inhabitants living in a size less than half of Tasmania. It is a very mountainous country and part of the Pacific Rim of Fire, subject to earthquakes. Spanish explorers became the first European visitors and changed the lives of indigenous Pipil Indians forever in the mid-1500s. Coffee, corn, beans and rice form its main agricultural produce. Honduras is a predominantly Roman Catholic country also ruled by Spain from the 16th Century. After Independence in the 1830, it was briefly annexed to Mexico, and by the 1900, it was ruled – ever so corruptly – by the military generals of the army. The country welcomed the US army during the contra war of its neighbours




during the 1980s and was spared most of the turbulence that others experienced. It remains a poor country with bananas as its major produce and export.

Guatemala has a rich cultural heritage unlike other countries in the region. Its population is over 65% indigenous Maya Indians. There is evidence of mankind from around 10,000 BCE; however, the country is well known for being the heart of the Mayan culture, which existed from around 1,600 years ago. It, too, was conquered by the Spanish and annexed to Mexico in the early 1800s. Since the end of the civil war, which lasted for 36 years, up to 1996, Guatemala has remained

relatively stable in a political sense and has enjoyed moderate economic growth. From ancient temples to charming colonial towns, volcanic

Dinner and drinks can be enjoyed alfresco in the evening, every night bringing the promise of a glorious Kimberley sunset.

During the day, Coral's open-sided Xplorer tender boats will take guests on excursions to the Kimberley's magnificent cliffs and waterfalls while providing shelter from the West Australian sun. Every day is a new adventure, from spotting native wildlife & birdlife in their natural habitat to finding a magical secluded beach for sunset canapés & sundowners.


We'll experience the thrill of riding the Horizontal Falls in inflatable Zodiac tender vessels and witness King George River and 80m tall twin King George waterfalls. We'll encounter Indigenous rock art galleries and





cruise the Prince Regent River to the 'hanging garden' King Cascade waterfall. We will get up close to Montgomery Reef and discover the tidal reef's diverse marine life. percentage of the countryside. In the Northeast, you can spot the big cats, the savannah animals and an amazing variety of birdlife. To the West, you'll see a plethora of elephants, hippos and chimps. But the stand-out wildlife experience is a close encounter with the magnificent mountain gorillas. Sadly, only about 900 of these majestic primates are left in the wild, but you are highly likely to see them in their natural habitat on this tour.






There is more to Uganda, however, than wildlife. With stunning scenery of jungles and grasslands, much of the country is on a plateau ascending to over 5,100 metres on Mount Stanley – the 3rd highest peak in Africa. Uganda shares Lake Victoria – the largest tropical lake in the world – as its eastern border with Kenya and Tanzania. The West first took notice of Uganda in the early 70s when the dictator Idi Amin took power. Dubbed "the butcher of Uganda", Amin was a military official who, after seizing power, was responsible for the expulsion and murder of hundreds of thousands of people. He died in exile in 2003; today, the country is at peace. Uganda is a predominantly Christian country, with 80% of the 30 million people of Christian faith. While the recent past ASK ABOUT OUR

of this struggling nation cannot be ignored, you will be greatly rewarded by visiting. Not just for the gorillas but also for the people, the magnificent scenery and the culture.





In three weeks, you will get a wonderful taste of what this country offers. What you experience, hear, taste and see, will engage all of your senses. Mongolia is one of the least-developed, least-populated countries in the world. With only 3.3 million inhabitants, roughly half of the country's population is packed into the capital Ulaanbaatar. Outside of that, Mongolia's largest



is unmatched in its wild beauty and rawness.



"cities" population remains in the tens of thousands, with a significant number still living a traditional lifestyle as nomadic herders. Horses and horse culture play a large role in daily and national life in Mongolia. It is traditionally said that "A Mongol without a horse is like a bird without the wings." Mongolia has more than 3.5 million horses, an equine population that outnumbers the country's human population.

Mongolia's Naadam Festival features the "three manly sports" of wrestling, archery and horse racing – the three skills that Chingis Khan valued most for his Mongol warriors. The festival has been running for centuries and is one of the most pure and honest cultural celebrations anywhere in the world – and our trip is timed to be a part of this.

Mongolia is a land of extremes. On the road, it can take hours of driving before you pass a tiny ger community, a Mongolian on horseback, or even another vehicle. Yet in between, you are blessed with dramatic countryside views that will imprint indelibly on your memory.









MADAGASCAR'S

JUL 2025 AYS Madagascar, 400 km off the East coast of Africa, is the world's fourth largest island, a fragment of Gondwanaland left behind when the ancient landmass split to form the continents of Africa, India and Australia; it stretches 1600 km from north to south and is 650 km across at its widest point. The most astonishing thing about the island is its flora and fauna, found nowhere else in the world. The island has been referred to as "nature's design laboratory" because of the many unique creatures and vegetation, some of quite a primitive nature.





The terrain varies from tropical rainforest to desert, from high stony plateaus to lush green islands with many unique geological and geographical formations. Madagascar has a range of unique animals and plants that have evolved here and, separated from the rest of the world. The most notable are the lemurs, of which nearly 30 species have been described. For the bird watcher, there are over 250 species, of which 106 are endemic, whilst for lovers of reptiles, most of the world's chameleons are found here. The flora has its peculiarities, the vegetation varying wildly by climatic region - thorny scrub in the southwest, tropical rainforest along the east coast, heath-land and moss forests on the central plateau and savannahs in the western lowlands. The two bestknown examples of these unusual plants are the fan-shaped Ravinala, known as the Traveller's Palm, and the Baobab, which has ten different species. We will see many examples of these throughout, while in the

tropical forests, we will see trees lush with ferns, fungi, mosses and orchids. Most of this unique flora and fauna, together with some now extinct species, were here when humans arrived 1500 to 2000 years ago.

The first inhabitants were Malay Polynesians who crossed the Indian Ocean in large canoes from Indonesia and South East Asia. These early settlers, mixed with later arrivals, African, Arab, Indian, and Portuguese traders,

and French colonials, formed the 18 current official tribes, collectively termed the Malagasy. For outdoor enthusiasts and those looking for something different - this trip is it!



CORSICA, SARDINIA,

If year-round sunshine, 7,000 years of living

history and the famous Mediterranean cuisine are your thing, then this trip should be on your bucket list. Discover these three wonderful Mediterranean Islands, each with its own unique culture.

Laid-back, rustic Corsica is French-governed with a captivating landscape. Its capital, Ajaccio, is the birthplace of Napoleon Bonaparte, and his ancestral home is today used as a museum. Sardinia remains part of Italy but has fiercely retained its proud culture and character. With landscapes of rugged mountains balanced by placid bays. Sardinian inland towns are known for their capers, olives and pecorino sardo and the coastal towns have a rich tradition of shellfish and seafood. In rural parts, stonewalled Neolithic fortresses called Nuraghes can still be seen in the fields. The sea around this large Mediterranean Island is among the most beautiful and

transparent in the world. The colour of the water on the Costa Smeralda has to The ex-British colony of Malta packs wonderful diversity into a small area. Comprising three small Islands - Malta, Gozo and Comino, which is uninhabited, it's a traveller's dream because you can take in everything within a small radius. Sample the architecture (both grand and quaint), a stunning fortified harbour, the rocky landscape, traditional hilltop towns, fishing villages, and an upbeat, lively capital city, all against the languid backdrop of the magnificent Mediterranean. 
The Aeolian Islands lie in the Tyrrhenian Sea off the north coast of Sicily and near Italy's

Those mountains are the Balkans, where farming first reached Europe, way back in the Neolithic era. To the west is the Adriatic Sea, with the Mediterranean Sea to the south and the Black Sea to the east. It is perhaps easier to think of the Balkan States as "South-eastern Europe". Wholly or partially on the peninsula, the region comprises many fascinating countries. Our tour includes seven of them – Macedonia, Albania, Montenegro, Croatia, Bosnia & Herzegovina, Slovenia and Serbia. Their polyglot nature has

been forged in turn by the Greeks, Romans and Slavs, and even fell part of the Ottoman Empire in the 16th Century. A genuine cultural crossroads, the Balkan region was where Orthodoxy met Christianity, and Christianity met Islam. While many of these names have been synonymous with political turmoil in modern history (Franz Ferdinand was assassinated in Sarajevo in 1914, sparking the First World War), the current reality is a collection of countries and cultures now relishing their own identities and enjoying a resurgence of interaction with the outside world. The region is rich in pre-history and history, with Neanderthal relics found in many areas and towns still with dramatic mediaeval fortifications in place. While typically characterised by peaceful mountainous terrain, many Balkan destinations feature pristine coastlines and seascapes, affording dazzling variety as you travel seamlessly from one country to another. Many places we visit have not yet become popular with tourists, but this will change. Are you ready for this journey of surprise and delight?

Patachitra, a local art of painting stories from mythology – large scrolls used to adorn the walls of palatial homes.

This is India as you may not have imagined, but certainly must experience.




